Hosted at the War Museum in Bloemfontein, South Africa and Online

In recent years the study and interpretation of the South African War has created new insights regarding the complexities of this war and the effect that this conflict had on the South African community, in particular women and children. This conference aims to assemble historians, academics and other scholars researching the violent histories of not only women and children in the South African War but in other wars, conflicts and pandemics as well (including themes from South African history from pre-colonial and pre-Union periods, the 1st and 2nd World Wars through the Apartheid era to the present day).

The conference is hosted during the period of 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence (25 November – 10 December 2022) with 25 November being declared by the United Nations as the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women. On 19 September 2019 President Cyril Rhamaphosa told Members of Parliament that: "There is a very violent and brutal war underway in South Africa against women and children". Therefore, the conference and it's stakeholders aim to highlight and support the central theme of "No Violence Against Women and Children".

During times of conflict, the strength of women and the vulnerability of children comes to the fore. In accordance with the War Museum's vision the conference will represent the inclusivity and suffering of all communities, thus also propagating the message that negotiation is preferable to war. Although the emphasis will inherently be on historical interpretations, the conference aims at including a multi-disciplinary approach.

Antjie Krog is an Afrikaans poet, writer and Professor at the University of the Western Cape. She published twelve volumes of poetry, as well as three non-fiction books: *Country of my Skull (1998)*, on the South African Truth and Reconciliation Commission; *A Change of Tongue (2004)* about the transformation in South Africa after ten years and *Begging to be Black (2009)* about learning to live within a black majority. Krog has also co-authored an academic book *There was this Goat (2009)* with two colleagues Prof Kopano Ratele and Nosisi Mpolweni, investigating the Truth Commission testimony of Mrs Notrose Nobomvu Konile. A book of essays was published in 2013 *Conditional Tense – Memory and Vocabulary after the South African Truth and Reconciliation Commission* as part of Seagull Books' African List. Her work has been translated into English, Dutch, Italian, French, Spanish, Swedish, Serbian, Arabic and Chinese.

Professor Heidi Hudson, Dean of the Faculty of the Humanities, University of the Free State



Heidi Hudson is a Professor of International Relations and is currently Dean of the Faculty of the Humanities, University of the Free State, Bloemfontein, South Africa. Prof Hudson specialises in feminist security studies, with a specific focus on Africa, and is an elected member of the Academy of Science of South Africa. She serves on several editorial boards, including *International Feminist Journal of Politics*, *Civil Wars*, *Revista Relaciones Internacionales*, and *Stichproben: Vienna Journal of African Studies*. As a former Advisory Board member of the African Peacebuilding Network (APN) of the Social Science Research Council in New York, Prof Hudson regularly mentors APN fellows. She also serves as an Advisory Board member for the African Research Universities Alliance (ARUA) Center of Excellence for Post-conflict Societies, hosted by the Institute of Peace and Security Studies (IPSS) of the Addis Ababa University. During her career she has been awarded several fellowships and has published widely in international journals and edited volumes. In 2018, she was the Claude Ake Visiting Chair, hosted by the Department of Peace and Conflict Research, Uppsala University and the Nordic Africa Institute.
